- Obtain a parking permit - 123 MSC (330-672-4432). You must be registered for classes to apply. If you registered in time, an application will be included with your tuition bill. See Page 7 or go online to www.kent.edu/vph/parking/index.html.

ACADEMIC ADVISING

Regional Campus Students: Schedule an academic advising appointment with the Kent Campus advising office, see directory below.

Transfer Students: After you have received your transfer credit evaluation make arrangements to see your academic adviser. If you are transferring 15 or fewer credits, you are encouraged to participate in the PASS program. You can meet with your adviser, register for classes and more, all in one visit. Call 330-672-2014 to make your reservation for the PASS program or you can arrange your advising appointment on your own by contacting your college office.

Get to know your academic adviser and meet each semester or at least once a year. Your adviser cares about your success at Kent State and can do more than just help you to choose the right classes. Remember that effective advising is a partnership - you and your adviser have responsibilities.

Don't know who your adviser is? A good place to start is at the college office that houses your academic major. Here is an example. If psychology is your major, you should go to the advising office in the College of Arts and Sciences, 105 Bowman. What if you haven't declared a major? Students who need academic advising as well as help in choosing a major and career are in the Exploratory program and are advised in the Student Advising Center in Lake Hall. Use this directory to find your adviser.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS CENTER continued:

The focus of the Academic Skills courses is the development and application of reading, learning, and study strategies. The Student Support Services project provides services for first-generation college students, low-income students and students with disabilities. University Tutoring includes tutoring in selected mathematics and writing courses, study groups in selected Liberal Education Requirement courses and individual peer counseling. Supplemental Instruction is available for students enrolled in large lecture classes. Small group study sessions are designed to help students improve their academic performance.

If you are registered for classes, you will have an e-mail account created for you and be given access to "Webmail" just before the semester begins. Your email password will be the first eight positions of your social security number. We recommend you change your password. Access your email from <http://webmail.kent.edu>.

Your Kent State University e-mail address is an important vehicle for sending and receiving communication from student and academic service offices, faculty and your adviser. The following information will assist in planning your financial aid.

Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and list Kent State University as a school to receive your information. If you have already completed a FAFSA but did not list Kent State University as one of the schools to receive your information, you must call the Federal Processor at 319-337-5665, and ask to have Kent State University added to your student aid report. The Federal Processor will ask you for your PIN number (located on the first page of the Student Aid Report) and they will ask you for Kent State University's Federal School Code. The code is 003051.

REGIONAL CAMPUS STUDENTS: Contact the Kent Campus Student Financial Aid Office to evaluate any financial aid you may have received at your regional campus.

TRANSFER STUDENTS:

- Must be admitted to Kent State to receive financial aid.
- For loan eligibility, the number of credit hours that transfer to Kent State is used to determine class year and loan amount.
- If you transfer mid-year, you must contact the financial aid office at your previous institution to cancel any future aid that institution has awarded you in order for aid to be awarded by Kent State.
- If the evaluation of your credits is completed after aid is awarded, contact the Financial Aid Office to determine if an adjustment is necessary.
- If you have been awarded an Ohio Instructional Grant, notify the Kent State University Financial Aid Office for paperwork to be completed.
- Apply for continuing student scholarships at www.sfa.kent.edu.

LOANS:

If you have been awarded a Federal Stafford Loan (subsidized or unsubsidized), Federal Direct Loan (subsidized or unsubsidized) or a Federal Parent Loan:

- Contact your current institution to cancel the remaining disbursements.
- Contact your lender to obtain a Deferment Form.
- Contact the financial aid office at your current institution for loan exit information.
- Discuss lending options with a Financial Aid Counselor at Kent State University.

If you were awarded a Perkin's Loan at a previous institution, notify the financial aid office at your current institution of your plans and obtain a deferment form. A loan exit interview will be required.

The **FLASH**card is your Kent State University ID card and more. It allows you to take materials out of the library, to access services such as the Student Recreation and Wellness Center and athletic events, and to purchase goods and services on campus. If you have a board plan, you will use your **FLASH**card to purchase meals in the cafeterias. You may also deposit money on your **FLASH**card and create a debit account, called **FLASH** Cash. This will allow you to make purchases both on and off campus wherever the **FLASH**card is accepted.

FLASH Cash is a prepaid purchase plan that works like a debit card. You make an initial deposit to your account, and charges are deducted as you make purchases. Money on this account carries over annually and is fully refundable.

There are three ways to add money to your **FLASH** Cash account:

1. Visit room 104 in the Kent Student Center and make a deposit using check, credit card or cash.
2. Use a DART machine. There are only two DART machines on campus - one is located on the first floor of the Library next to the copiers, the other is located on the first floor of the Kent Student Center adjacent to the student organization offices.
3. Call the **FLASH**card office at 330-672-CARD (2273) and make a deposit using a credit card.

FLASHGUIDE

The FlashGuide is a daily planner as well as great source of information on Kent State University. We strongly encourage all students to purchase a FlashGuide, which is available at the bookstores. The FlashGuide contains important phone numbers, campus information ranging from academic advising to the campus bus system, a campus map, building abbreviations, useful terms, information on student organizations, and much more. The FlashGuide is your one-stop guide to Kent State University.

HONORS COLLEGE

If you are a student with outstanding intellectual and creative ability, you belong in Kent State's Honors College. As an honors student, you will participate in special honors classes and colloquia taught by distinguished faculty. Honors classes are small and stress active participation. The Individual Honors Work course offers you the opportunity to design your own learning or create special projects to fit your major. In addition, you will benefit from the one-on-one advising you will receive from your Honors College adviser. You may also complete a Senior Honors Thesis/Project.

If you have a 3.2 GPA or higher from your previous institution and are interested in applying, please call the Honors College at 330-672-2312 and ask for a transfer packet. Regional campus students with a cumulative GPA of 3.2 or higher should contact the Honors College at 330 672-2312.

MANDATORY IMMUNIZATIONS

Kent State University policy requires that all students who have never attended the Kent campus must comply with the following immunization requirements. All students must show proof of immunity to measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR). This means two measles, mumps, rubella or MMR injections after age 1 and at least one month apart or an MMR injection within the past six years. **Students born prior to 1957 or students who have graduated from a State of Ohio accredited high school since 1993 are exempt from this requirement.**

Students from the following countries are required to have a tuberculosis screening test (TB test - Mantoux-type); Africa, Asia, the Middle East and Pacific Islands (except Japan), the Caribbean, Eastern Europe, Russia, Mexico, Central America and South America. This test must be completed within 12 months prior to starting classes.

The required immunization and screening may be obtained at the Health Services Clinic, local health department, or private physician's office. Charges for these immunizations vary.

ORIENTATION

You may wish to consider the convenience of living on campus. On-campus housing is also available for married and single-parent students in the Allerton Apartments.

If you are coming to the Kent Campus with fewer than **60** semester hours (90 quarter hours) you will be required to live on campus unless you plan to commute from the home of a parent or legal guardian within 50 miles of the Kent campus. An exemption to this requirement must be submitted to Residence Services for review.

Valid reasons for an exemption include the following:

- Students who are 21 years of age or older prior to the first day of classes for the semester
- Married students
- Single parents with primary child-rearing responsibilities
- Military personnel with one or more years of full-time active duty
- Students who have lived in college on-campus housing for four or more semesters
- Students who have completed two full-time academic years of college enrollment

A housing contract is in effect for the entire academic year (fall and spring).

SCHEDULE OF CLASSES AND UNIVERSITY CATALOG

(Two important sources of academic information...Get them; read them; keep them.)

The ***Schedule of Classes*** booklet, available at the Registrar's Office or your college advising office, comes out just before students register for the next term. If you are a transfer student and were admitted early, you will be sent a *Schedule of Classes* booklet by the Admissions Office as soon as the booklets are available. Students coming from one of the regional campuses can request a booklet from the Registrar's Office or pick one up at your regional campus. Your alternative for the most up-to-date information is to check the Registrar's Office web site (<http://www.registrars.kent.edu/book/schdcsearch.cfm>) or Web for Students (<https://wfs.kent.edu/>) and click on offered course sections.

Be sure to keep this booklet even after you have registered for classes. It is full of important information - a calendar for the term (deadlines, breaks, important dates), the final exam schedule, fees and payment info, advising schedules, financial aid info, how to read your KAPS (degree audit) report and much more. The same information is available on the web.

The **University Catalog** is a contract between you and the University. If you meet the requirements as outlined in the catalog (regardless of campus location), you earn your degree. In many cases, you will follow the same catalog you received when you began at Kent State so make sure you keep it. If you are coming from a regional campus, you already should have a Kent State catalog. Catalogs are available from the Admissions Office and your college advising office. If you are living on campus, you can also get one from your area desk at the beginning of the fall semester. It is your responsibility to learn how to use your catalog. Your adviser can help you to understand rules and requirements written in the formal language of the University.

Student Disability Services will work with you to arrange services ranging from coordination of on-campus transportation and parking to classroom accommodation such as note-takers, alternate testing locations and extended time for exams. You must provide appropriate documentation of your disability to Student Disability Services in order to be eligible to receive these services.

After you have submitted the necessary documentation, you need to schedule a pre-enrollment interview with a member of the SDS staff at least 4-6 weeks before you start your classes.

You may view both on- and off-campus employment opportunities through The Career Services Center web site. Students seeking on-campus, part-time employment must go to The Career Services Center and complete a Student Appointment Form as the initial step in the employment process. No student may be hired to work without a Student Appointment Form, which authorizes a student to pursue an on-campus job.

All students must be enrolled for a minimum of half-time status (six undergraduate credit hours or four graduate credit hours) and must maintain this enrollment status throughout the semester to hold an on-campus job.

Students applying for employment for the first time must present original documents to The Career Services Center to establish their identity. Samples of acceptable documents include: a Kent State University ID card, state driver's license, or other form of picture ID **and** an original or certified copy of a birth certificate bearing an official seal. An entire list of acceptable documents can be obtained from The Career Services Center web site.

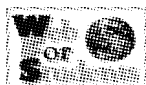

Web for Students is an online interactive site designed to allow you to view your student record including grades, registration and financial aid. You can also use Web for Students to access, monitor, and change some personal information. In addition, Web for Students provides the ability to apply online for financial aid and to pay tuition.

We asked some students what they would do differently if they had their first semester at the Kent campus to do all over again. Here are some of their responses. (And we swear we didn't make these up!)

- When it is your turn to register, do it then! Don't wait!
- Do not skip ANY classes!
- Do not go out the night before an early class.
- Talk to students who have been here awhile. They can be very helpful.
- Get a daily planner and use it. (i.e. the FlashGuide)
- Make sure you have the correct schedule, and you are going to the right classes.
- Don't procrastinate! Turn your work in on time.
- When you get a parking ticket, pay it immediately or else you'll get a "hold" on everything!
- As soon as you know what major you want, go to that department and start the process of declaring it.
- Read the class syllabus!
- Have fun!
- Get to know the "lay of the land" i.e., where different buildings and services are on campus.
- Have a positive attitude. Look at coming here as a new chance. Don't compare this experience to your other school or campus.
- Get involved and meet people.
- Experience and appreciate the diversity here. You will encounter this wherever you work.
- Don't let everything overwhelm you; there are probably more similarities than differences to your previous institution.
- Don't underestimate the difficulty or pace of your classes.
- Attend the **Transitions** orientation program.

To help you feel as if you really belong at the Kent Campus at Kent State University, here is a list of commonly used terms.

ACADEMIC STANDING: If you have a cumulative 2.00 grade point average or above, you are considered in good academic standing. Students with a cumulative grade point average below 2.00 are placed on academic probation.

BLACK SQUIRREL: The unofficial mascot of Kent State and the name of an annual campus event.

BURSAR'S OFFICE: The University office where payments of tuition and fees are made.

CATALOG YEAR: A term identifying the specific Catalog which contains the requirements defining a student's degree program. Initially, it is the Catalog in Force during the student's first semester at Kent State University. Refer to the Catalog in Force policy in the General Requirements and Regulations section of the Catalog.

COLLEGE: Academic organizational division of the University offering curricular programs leading to baccalaureate or advanced degrees.

COURSE WITHDRAWAL: Removing a class from your schedule during the course withdrawal period (weeks 3 -10 spring and fall). You will receive a grade of "W" in the course. Don't confuse withdrawing from a course with dropping a course. You can drop a class in the first 2 weeks of a semester and there will be no record of the class on your transcript. You can withdraw from or drop a class by phone or by using Web for Students if you have no registration holds.

DEAN'S LIST: Recognition given to students who earn a semester G.P.A. of 3.40 or better in at least 12 graded hours.

DISMISSAL: Academic action taken by a college dean that prevents students who have failed to maintain good academic standing from continuing at Kent State.

DIVERSITY REQUIREMENT: Course requirements that help educate students to live in a world of diverse communities. Talk to your academic adviser for more information on the diversity requirement.

FLASHCARD: Your student ID card and more - it can be used at the bookstore, to check out library materials, and to purchase food on and off campus. It also gets you into campus events and facilities. Don't leave home without it. The **Flashcard Office** is located on the ground level of the Kent Student Center.

FRESHMAN FORGIVENESS: Also known as "Freshman Rule for Recalculation of Grade Point Average." This policy allows you, under certain conditions, to repeat courses in which you've earned a D or F. Talk to your adviser to see if you are eligible.

FULL TIME: You are considered a full time student if you registered for at least 12 semester hours. Full time status affects financial aid, athletic eligibility and insurance.

GOLDEN FLASHES: The official name of the Kent State athletic teams.

INCOMPLETE: A grade which may be given to students who are unable to complete the last three weeks of the semester because of factors beyond their control.

KAPS REPORT: An automated degree audit system that reflects the progress you have made towards completion of your degree requirements in your officially declared program. The report compares your completed (including transfer/transient credit), "progress" and registered coursework with program requirements. You can access your KAPS report at <https://wfs.kent.edu>. You may also request a KAPS report for a major you are considering.

LOWER DIVISION: A student with freshman or sophomore standing; may also refer to a course with a number that begins with a 1 or 2.

OMBUDS: The person at Kent State who assists students in resolving University-related problems, concerns, and grievances.

OVERLOAD: Enrolling in more than 18 hours during fall or spring semester. An overload requires the Dean of the college's permission and results in additional tuition.

PREREQUISITE: Course(s) or condition(s) required before enrollment in a more advanced class.

PRESIDENT'S LIST: Recognition given to students who earn a semester GPA of 4.0 in at least 15 graded hours.

PROBATION (ACADEMIC): A warning to students who fail to maintain an overall grade point average of 2.00 or better. If you fail to improve your GPA within a specified time, you may be dismissed.

QUALITY POINTS: The number of points assigned per credit hour for each letter grade: A=4 points, B=3 points, C=2 points, D=1 point and F=0 points.

REGISTRAR'S OFFICE: The University office that plans and oversees registration activities, academic record maintenance, transcript preparation, degree audit system (KAPS) and Web for Students.

REINSTATEMENT: Permission from a dean allowing a student to return to Kent State after being dismissed. It is the result of a successful reinstatement application and is not guaranteed.

SEMESTER: Kent State's academic year is two semesters, fall and spring. Each semester lasts 16 weeks (15 weeks of classes, 1 week of final exams). Don't say quarters... everyone will know you are new.

TRANSIENT COURSEWORK: Coursework approved for Kent State University students who take courses at other schools which will count toward their Kent State degree.

UNIVERSITY EXIT: Withdrawal from all University courses by Friday of the last week of classes. Talk to your adviser about summer deadlines.

UPPER DIVISION: A student with junior or senior standing; may also refer to a course with a number that begins with a 3 or 4.

WRITING INTENSIVE REQUIREMENT: A graduation requirement for all undergraduate students that helps them to become effective writers in their majors.

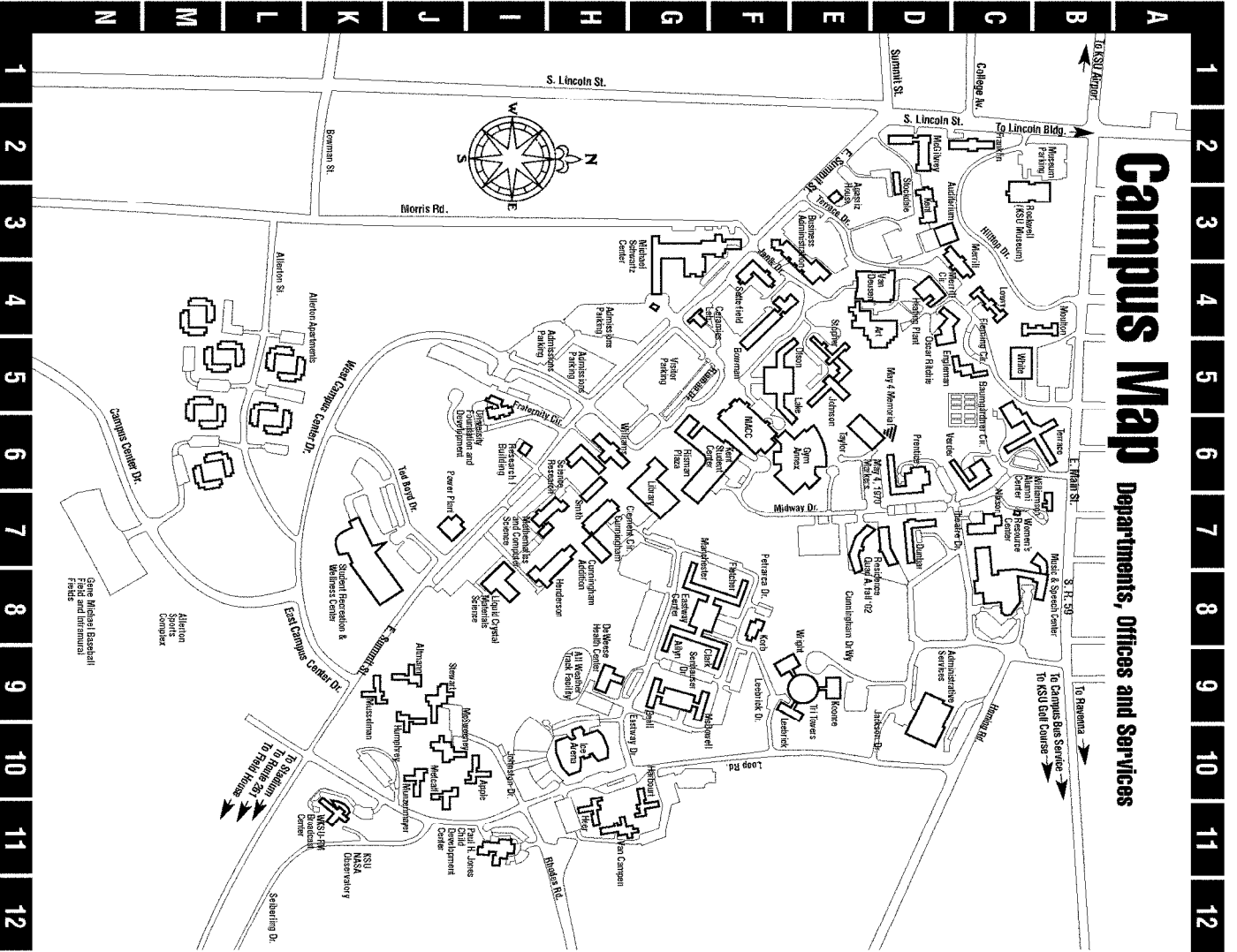

DIRECTIONS TO KENT STATE UNIVERSITY

Located in Kent, Ohio, the Kent Campus is ideally situated in northeastern Ohio, amid rolling terrain dotted by spring-fed lakes. Kent, a city of some 30,000, rests on the banks of the Cuyahoga River in Portage County. Yet, "big city" enthusiasts are only a short drive from four major urban centers - 11 miles east of Akron, 33 miles southeast of Cleveland, 40 miles west of Youngstown and 28 miles north of Canton, with airports offering access to the nation and the world. Kent State University is easily accessible from all directions via major interstate highways; Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Indiana turnpikes; Cleveland Hopkins Airport; and Akron-Canton Airport.

From I-76

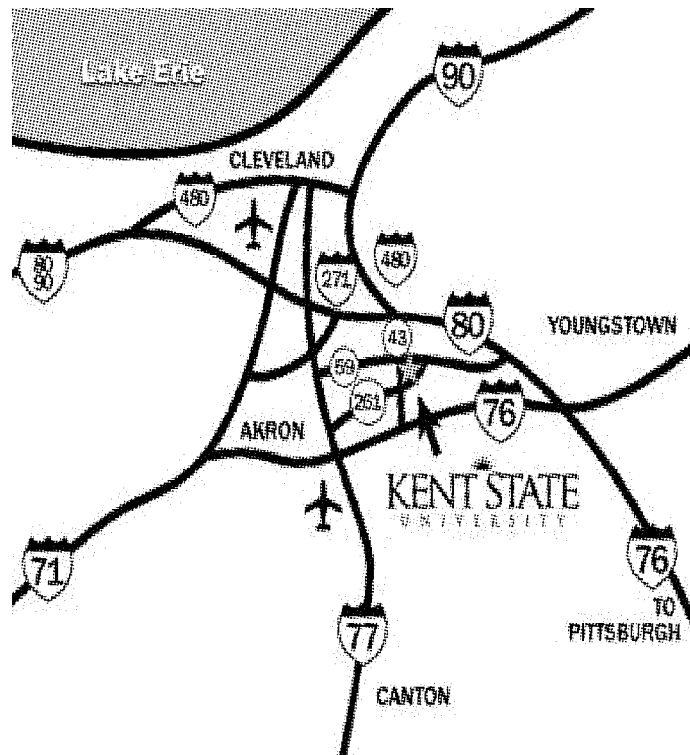
Take the Kent/Route 43 exit (exit 33) and proceed north to Route 261. Turn right (east) onto route 261. Proceed 1/4 mile to Campus Center Drive. Turn left onto Campus Center Drive and follow it to the stop sign at the junction of East Campus Center Drive and West Campus Center Drive. Proceed to your destination from this point by following the signage at that intersection.

From I-80 (Ohio Turnpike)

Use exit 187/13 (Streetsboro). After the toll booth, proceed straight (follow Ravenna sign) onto Route 14 traveling southeast, go past Route 303 to Route 43. Turn right (south) on Route 43 and continue south for approximately six miles until you come to the traffic light at the dead end at Haymaker Parkway in the city of Kent. Turn left (east) onto Haymaker and follow until you reach the traffic light at the intersection of Lincoln and Haymaker. Proceed to your destination from this point by following the signs.

From I-90

Proceed toward Cleveland. Take I-271 south to I-480 east; stay on I-480 until it becomes Route 14 in Streetsboro. Turn right (south) on Route 43 and continue south for approximately six miles until you come to the traffic light at the dead end at Haymaker Parkway in the city of Kent. Turn left (east) onto Haymaker Parkway and follow until you reach the traffic light at the intersection of Lincoln and Haymaker. Proceed to your destination from this point by following the signs.
