- Homework will be assigned in class and posted on the Theory web page

MIDTERM PROJECT

Set one of the Blues Lyrics for Voice, piano and or Guitar, Bass and drums Requirements:

- 1. Notated vocal part with lyrics and chord symbols
 - a. Notated Bass part with chord symbols
 - b. Better: notated piano/guitar and chord symbols
 - c. Minimum: Chord symbols with notated rhythms
 - d. Notate at least one measure of the drum part and indicate where fills and hits are
- 2. Prepare Parts:
 - a. Lead sheet: melody and chord symbols
 - b. Bass part
 - c. Piano/Guitar with lead sheet
 - d. Drum with lead sheet
- 3. Performed live during the Midterm Composition time
- 4. Grade will be based upon:
 - a. Quality and effectiveness of composition
 - b. Following the requirements
 - c. Quality of the performance

FINAL PROJECT

Compose a song with lyrics. The song will be performed during the final exam period Parameters:

- 1. NOT in BLUES FORM
- 2. choose either:
 - a. AABA, American song form, with some type of expansion. For example:
 - i. AABA BA
 - ii. intro AABA coda
 - iii. Some other combination
 - b. Verse Chorus with a bridge. For example
 - i. VVCVCBC
- 3. Lyrics can be original or borrowed. If they are borrowed they should be in the public domain.
- 4. Minimum orchestration: Voice, Piano, guitar, bass and drums
- 5. Form bust be clearly indicated and all sections labeled
- 6. Include chord symbols (C7, Am, Dm7b5 ect) and Roman Numerals/modulations
- 7. Notated Create a score and a set of parts for each performer. For the minimum orchestration you would need to create:
 - a. Piano/vocal score for the pianist and singer
 - b. Guitar/vocal part
 - c. Bass/vocal part
 - d. Drum/Vocal part
- 8. Notate rhythm section with chord symbols and melody with lyrics
- 9. The piece will be performed during the Final Exam Period
- 10. Grade will be based upon:
 - a. Quality and effectiveness of composition

- b. Following the requirements
- c. Quality of the performance

MIDTERM and FINAL

Written tests that will cover the theoretical material covered in class. The Final will be comprehensive.

PAPER/PRESENTATIONS

Each student will give a 15 minute presentation on a paper they have written on a popular song of their choice.

The paper will include

- 1. Background on the song: date composed, date performed/recorded
- 2. Information of the composer, lyricist, performer, recording
- 3. Recording of the song
- 4. Score of the song: published or transcription If a score is not available you must at least write out a lead sheet with chords melody and lyrics. In order to help with the transcription, you might be able to find online a MIDI file of the song, a lyric sheet with chords, the guitar tabs. If you find a published score make sure to find out if the score is in the same key. Also point out errors and differences in the score. If there are different scores try to find the one that matches the recording you will be using.
- 5. An analysis of the piece. The analysis will include discussions of:
 - a. Meter, tempo
 - b. Key, scales
 - c. Genre
 - d. Chordal analysis guitar chords, roman numerals
 - e. form analysis
 - f. possible compositional procedure
 - g. the relationship between lyrics and music

The presentation will last 15 minutes and must include:

- 1. Distribution of a copy of the paper to each classmate at least one class time before the presentation
- 2. Listening to the song following the score
- 3. discussion of the analysis of the piece

RECITAL ATTENDANCE

For all music majors (Bachelor of Arts, Music Performance, Music Education and Music Technology) the graduation requirement is a total of 84 concerts. Music Majors should attend 12 concerts per semester in order to stay on track for graduation. All on-campus music concerts advertised in the Cultural Flash and the Fall 2011 Recital/Concert List are automatically approved. YOU MUST TURN IN YOUR SIGNED CONCERT ATTENDANCE FORM AT YOUR JURY.

- a) You may only include three concerts in which you perform as stated on the reverse side of the Recital Card.
- b) Off campus concerts must be approved by either your applied teacher or by Dr. Birch, Professor Kramer, Professor Seeds or Dr. Vaccaro.
- c) Only one musical theatre production is allowed.
- d) A maximum of three concerts at college or professional level at the OMEA State Convention will be allowed.
- e) Music Technology Majors may attend popular music concerts of a professional nature but must have proof of attendance (ticket, program etc)
- f) Music Technology majors may attend other concerts if they write a one-page report describing the setup, the equipment used and its application. These reports need to be turned in to either Dr. Birch or Dr. Vaccaro.
- g) No High School productions or concerts, including those at the OMEA Convention will be allowed.
- h) Recital or concert programs must be handed in and recorded on the Recital Attendance card within TWO WEEKS of the concert. Programs received after two weeks may not be considered valid.

MUSIC CONVOCATION

- Music Student Convocation will be held on Thursdays from 12:00 12:25 pm in room FA101. Convocation is mandatory for all music majors taking applied music. All students must perform during convocation as a soloist or ensemble once a year. The performance may also serve as the audition for the Student Recital. The applied instructor will assist with the preparation for the performance. Original compositions and "electronic materials" are acceptable with permission from the instructor.
- 2. Attendance will be taken each week by a student worker or one of the music faculty. Issues regarding attendance should be discussed with your applied teacher at your lesson or during office hours.

- 3. Attendance policy:
 - 1 2 absences = no penalty
 - 3 absences = applied grade lowered 1/2 letter grade
 - 4 absences = applied grade lowered 1 letter grade
 - 5 absences = applied grade lowered 1+1/2 letter grade
 - 6 absences = applied grade lowered 2 letter grade
 - 7 or more absences = applied grade lowered 3 letter grades
- 4. There will be 11 convocations this semester. Music majors will sign up for solo or ensemble performances during their assigned semester. Last names A-L will perform Fall Semester, M-Z, Spring semester. Ensembles may have cross-overs between semesters. THE SIGN UP SHEET WILL BE ON THE APPLIED MUSIC BULLETIN BOARD. If the music major does not perform during the fall or spring semester, the spring applied music grade will be lowered one letter grade.
