MAC GAMUT 6

- MacGamut 6 is an excellent program for practicing ear training and rudiments of music theory.
- You must practice daily
- You are expected to practice at least one hour a week to obtain the weekly goals (see schedule)
- Send your MGS file attached to an email every Wednesday

DAILY QUIZZES

- Short, graded, written quizzes will be given every day
- These guizzes will take up the first five (5) minutes and cannot be taken if you arrive late
- These quizzes will cover the assigned reading and materials
- The lowest 10% of the scores, including absences, will be dropped
- · Every first day of the week you will be given a quiz that will cover your assigned reading and homework
- The dropped scores will be added to the grade as extra credit (attendance pays!)

TESTS: MIDTERM QUIZ AND COMPREHENSIVE FINAL QUIZ

- There are separate tests for Theory and Aural skills
- The Aural Skills grade will be the average of the written test and the individual

GRADING SYSTEM

Tests and quizzes and homework will be graded with the percentage system

MAKEUP EXAMS

Make-up exams are highly discouraged. Do not assume that absence from an exam or a quiz will result in an automatic make-up. Acceptable proof must be presented to the professor, and all make-ups will be subject to special restrictions of time and place

Makeups for daily quizzes will not be offered

FINAL PROJECT

- Compose a work for at least two instrumentalists and or singers to be performed during the final exam period that incorporates material learned during the semester
- You need to arrange for your own performers
- You may not ask faculty or accompanists to play your pieces
- You may bring in outside musicians
- Your piece must be notated correctly and legibly. Prepare parts for each instrumentalist Pianists and singers can receive a score

At the performance, turn in a copy of the full score for the jury

A successful piece will be:

- A good composition for at least two performers. The composer can be one of the performers.
- Well-performed You will need to arrange for the performers to rehearse adequately and come during the final exam period. Hint find possible performers before you start writing
- There is no minimum duration for the composition The ultimate criterion is that the piece must sound complete and reveal effort on the part of the student

Not acceptable are:

- A work for piano played by two performers, one hand each
- An arrangement of someone else's work
- A piece that can't be notated

ATTENDANCE

You are allowed 5 unexcused absences per semester

Each tardy (showing up after class starts) will count as ½ an absence

Each tardy of more than 30 minutes will count as an absence

According to the "3342-3-06 Administrative policy regarding class attendance and class absence" the university only accepts as valid excuses:

- 2. Certified Death of an immediate family member (spouse, grandparents, parents, siblings)
- 3. Sanctioned KSU activity to which you must participate

Each additional unexcused absence will result in having 10% taken off your final grade.

RECITAL ATTENDANCE

For all music majors (Bachelor of Arts, Music Performance, Music Education and Music Technology) the graduation requirement is a total of 84 concerts. Music Majors should attend 12 concerts per semester in order to stay on track for graduation. All on-campus music concerts advertised in the Cultural Flash and the Fall 2011 Recital/Concert List are automatically approved. YOU MUST TURN IN YOUR SIGNED CONCERT ATTENDANCE FORM AT YOUR JURY.

- a) You may only include three concerts in which you perform as stated on the reverse side of the Recital Card.
- b) Off campus concerts must be approved by either your applied teacher or by Dr. Birch, Professor Kramer, Professor Seeds or Dr. Vaccaro.
- c) Only one musical theatre production is allowed.
- d) A maximum of three concerts at college or professional level at the OMEA State Convention will be allowed.
- e) Music Technology Majors may attend popular music concerts of a professional nature but must have proof of attendance (ticket, program etc)
- f) Music Technology majors may attend other concerts if they write a one-page report describing the setup, the equipment used and its application. These reports need to be turned in to either Dr. Birch or Dr. Vaccaro.
- g) No High School productions or concerts, including those at the OMEA Convention will be allowed.
- h) Recital or concert programs must be handed in and recorded on the Recital Attendance card within TWO WEEKS of the concert. Programs received after two weeks may not be considered valid.

MUSIC CONVOCATION

1. Music Student Convocation will be held on Thursdays from 12:00 - 12:25 pm in room FA101. Convocation is mandatory for all music majors taking applied music. All students must perform during convocation as a

soloist or ensemble once a year. The performance may also serve as the audition for the Student Recital. The applied instructor will assist with the preparation for the performance. Original compositions and "electronic materials" are acceptable with permission from the instructor.

- 2. Attendance will be taken each week by a student worker or one of the music faculty. Issues regarding attendance should be discussed with your applied teacher at your lesson or during office hours.
- 3. Attendance policy:
 - 1 2 absences = no penalty
 - 3 absences = applied grade lowered 1/2 letter grade
 - 4 absences = applied grade lowered 1 letter grade
 - 5 absences = applied grade lowered 1+1/2 letter grade
 - 6 absences = applied grade lowered 2 letter grade
 - 7 or more absences = applied grade lowered 3 letter grades
- 4. There will be 11 convocations this semester. Music majors will sign up for solo or ensemble performances during their assigned semester. Last names A-L will perform Fall Semester, M-Z, Spring semester. Ensembles may have cross-overs between semesters. THE SIGN UP SHEET WILL BE ON THE APPLIED MUSIC BULLETIN BOARD. If the music major does not perform during the fall or spring semester, the spring applied music grade will be lowered one letter grade.
